Introduction:



The book of Ephesians is written to a group of Christ-followers that Paul knew very well. His connection to the people of Ephesus is vividly described in Acts 19-20. In the three weeks we have

together, we will look at the first half of the letter Paul wrote to these friends. The book follows Paul's typical pattern and includes practical information about prayer, key foundational doctrines, and inspiring assurances of God's continuing work through the church today.

Dr. Hernandez is author of the award-winning *Scribal Habits and Theological Influences in the Apocalypse* (Mohr Siebeck, 2006), co-editor of *Studies on the Text of the New Testament and Early Christianity* (Brill, 2015), and lead translator of Josef Schmid's *Studies in the History of the Greek Text of the Apocalypse: The Ancient Stems* (SBL Press, 2018). He is also the General Editor for the Society of Biblical Literature's *Text-Critical Studies* series and serves on the Editorial Boards of three journals.

Oftentimes the history of women is glossed over or even ignored by historians of Christianity. However, there is a rich history of women's participation in the faith including

their roles as martyrs, mystics, prophets, leaders, and reformers. This three-part series will explore the history of women's leadership, various roles, and experiences within the global Christian church.

Speaker Bio:

Dr. Wojciechowski is assistant professor of Church History at Luther Seminary, and the associate editor of the journal *Word & World*. She is the author of *Women and the Christian Story: A Global History* (1517 Media, 2022). Her areas of interest are women's history, American history, modern European history, and the interaction between religion and social reform.
